There are countless adventures here in Appalachia and most of them within a reasonable drive from home. If you're reading this newsletter from anywhere in Central Appalachia you've probably heard of Tweetsie Railroad. If you haven't, wow you really missed out on a gem right here in Appalachia.



Tweetsie Railroad is a Wild West themed amusement park located between Boone and Blowing Rock, North Carolina. The park opened up in 1957 with the signature 3 mile train ride using the coal fired steam locomotive #12, the only surviving narrowgauge engine of the old East Tennessee and Western North Carolina Railroad, often referred to as ET&WNC. The steam engine is something from a bygone era of American ingenuity that was built in 1917. The name "Tweetsie" came from the locals and refers to the *tweet*, *tweet* sound of the train whistle.


